

CLIMBING HIGHER!

Young shuttlers took centre court as the Badminton Junior Ladder brought energy, competition, and plenty of cheering to the Gymkhana

A sports competition ladder is a ranking system used to track the performance of teams or individual players. It provides a clear, ongoing summary of standings, showing who is leading the competition and who needs to improve to reach the top positions.

BG's Badminton section held a Junior Ladder competition on 1 November which had a great turnout of approximately 25 children thronging the courts with parents in tow to cheer.

Naheed Divecha led this entire effort. She was instrumental in conceptualising and executing this event. She was ably supported by our ever-ready supporter of youngsters, ex-Badminton secretary Gautam Ashra, along with the efforts of Zeenie Poonawala, the Badminton subcommittee, the Shuttle Craze coaching team of Mangirish Palekar and his able assistants and the club's markers. The U-11, U-13 and U-15 age groups had the most participants in the boys' section, while the girls' participation was the maximum in the U-13 age group.

Each player played a single 30-point game with all the other participants in

his/her age group to earn 1 point per win. At the end of the morning, each participant's points were added up and each child very eagerly put his/ her own name into the relevant slot on our ladder, which is up for everyone's viewing purpose on the courts' noticeboard.

The ladder gives everyone a quick snapshot of who's on top, who's chasing hard, and who's got some work to do. It keeps things exciting because every match can change the order — one big win or close loss might make all the difference. The best example of this is amongst our two best youngsters on our courts - Anay Arlekar and Kabir

THE LADDER SERVES SEVERAL KEY PURPOSES

- **Motivation**: Players can track their progress and set goals to climb higher on the ladder.
- **Transparency:** Fans, coaches, and participants can easily see standings and understand how rankings are determined.
- Competition structure: It provides a fair and consistent method of determining playoff positions, or teams' eligibility.

Banerjee. Theirs was the longest and hard fought game with long rallies and we are sure the ladder rankings will be altered most among them as each of them works towards de-throning the other from the top rank - currently held by Anay Arlekar in three age groups!

This ladder will also help our juniors play at other clubs with children of similar standing and judge for themselves how much they need to improve to be at par or better!

For those who missed out on this event. feel free to challenge the lowest ranked played in your age group anytime in December and see yourself up on the ladder and keep steadily working towards rising in the ranks!

The ladder helps everyone see how close the competition is and encourages players to keep working hard.

It's also exciting for families and friends to follow along and cheer their favourite kids!

At the end of it all. we celebrate evervone's effort whether at the top of the ladder still climbing. what matters most is having fun and playing fair. BG

Unfiltered!

Nivé Raitz von Frentz reports on a spirited discussion of Arundhati Roy's searing memoir

Another healthy turnout on 10 November to discuss this month's book, the much-acclaimed *Mother Mary Comes To Me*; a paean of brittle love that was the author's very complex, fractious relationship with her mother. Opinion was divided, as some felt there was much self-

indulgent repetition, the language caustic and overly candid, while others were carried away by the lilting, lyrical and—to use a cliché—'unputdownable' prose.

"I had to leave in order to love my mother," says Roy when, at 18, she cut off contact with Mrs Roy for several years, which

one member felt was hugely brave; others felt many of her statements were attention seeking. Another member dubbed it a "bad girl" story where the author is shown to break away from

convention, be it her involvement in political activism, smoking or living with a partner.

The bold red book cover came under focus, especially images of the same

black and white photo sequentially fading on the inside front and back flaps - and the black moth, which is a recurring metaphorical theme.

What is the thought underlying writing such a book and was it an "artifice", a reflection of Roy's moral compass that she waited to publish only

after her mother's death? She seems "unafraid of being criticised and critiqued," according to one member.

One member said that the very act of publishing is in itself a "construct". There

was some talk about whether one's family's permission was needed to write about them—did it depend on the genre—documentary fiction versus fiction?

A discussion which raises more questions than answers would seem to be the best kind! 86





Growing up in a Hindu household, December never revolved around Christmas. Our big celebration, Diwali, was earlier in the year, full of light, love, family, and firecrackers! Christmas was something I saw from a distance; beautiful, but not mine.

Then I spent last year studying in Manchester, and suddenly Christmas was everywhere. The second November rolled in, the cities lit up like they'd been waiting all year. Markets appeared overnight. Every café pushed some kind of festive drink. And the lights? They rivalled my own Diwali decor!

I didn't step into the season expecting anything. But it was hard not to get swept up in that atmosphere.
