The swimming pool area underwent a complete transformation, with the underground baby pool repurposed for optimized use, a gazebo-style roof added to the hot spa area for a premium all-weather experience, and two adjoining lawns merged into one, finished with high-quality selection-I grass and bordered by a Gabion wall to create a natural aesthetic. Ambience lighting was also installed across the lawn, enhancing the evening atmosphere. This renovation has significantly improved the visual appeal and functionality of the poolside, making it one of the standout features of Bombay Gymkhana.

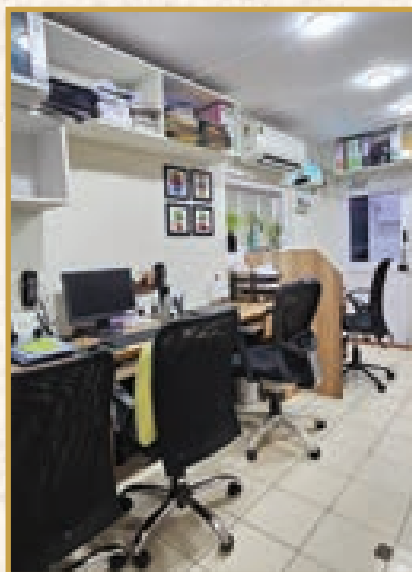
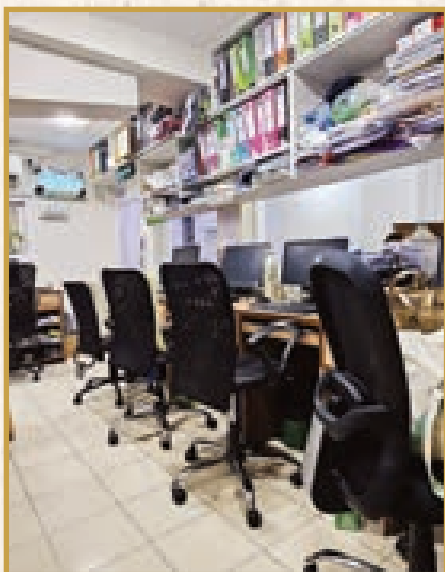

2. In accordance with Article 38(c) of the Articles of Association ("AOA") of the Gymkhana, in relation to the Managing Committee, members of the Managing Committee, who retire by rotation at the AGM, shall be eligible for re-election upon their notifying the Chief Executive Officer, in writing, no later than 5.00 p.m. on Tuesday, 26th August, 2025, of their willingness to offer themselves for re-election.
3. In accordance with Article 12(c) read with Article 38(c) of the AOA of the Gymkhana, in relation to the Balloting Committee, members of the Balloting Committee who retire by rotation at the AGM shall be eligible for re-election, upon their notifying the Chief Executive Officer in writing, no later than 5.00 p.m. on Tuesday, 26th August, 2025, of their willingness to offer themselves for re-election.
4. The Members of the Managing Committee are elected in accordance with the provisions of the AOA of the Gymkhana and the Companies Act, 2013 ("Act"), on an honorary basis and do not draw any remuneration or sitting fee.
5. In accordance with Article 38(c) of the AOA of the Gymkhana in relation to the Managing Committee, and Article 12(c) read with Article 38(c) of the Articles of Association of the Gymkhana in relation to the Balloting Committee, a list shall be posted on the General Notice Board not later than 5.00 p.m. on Wednesday, 3rd September, 2025, of those members of the Managing Committee and Balloting Committee stating against each such member's name whether or not he/ she has offered himself/herself for re-election.
6. In accordance with Article 38(d) of the AOA of the Gymkhana in relation to the Managing Committee and in accordance with Article 12(b) read with Article 38(d) in relation to the Balloting Committee, Permanent Members and Life Members willing to serve on the Managing Committee or Balloting Committee respectively shall also be eligible for election thereto upon being duly proposed by one Permanent Member or Life Member and seconded by another Permanent Member or Life Member. As per Article 12(a) of the AOA of the Gymkhana, a Member seeking election to the Balloting Committee should have been either a Permanent Member or a Life Member for at least 10 (ten) years before his/her election on the Balloting Committee. REPORT OF THE MANAGING COMMITTEE

Dear Members,

The Members of your Managing Committee have pleasure in presenting their Report on the activities and operations of the Gymkhana, together with the audited Financial Statements for the Financial Year ended March 31, 2025.

PERFORMANCE

Accounts & Finance: In FY 24-25, revenue from operations increased to ₹31.47 crores from ₹28.84 crores in the previous year, an increase of 9%. This was mainly on account of better performance of Bar, Catering, Shop and higher collections from Activities & Events and Games fees. As there was a corresponding increase in cost of consumption, the net deficit from operational activities remained at almost the same levels i.e. ₹19.62 crores in FY 24-25 as compared to ₹19.31 crores in the previous year.

Other income declined from ₹10.17 crores in FY 23-24 to ₹6.78 cores in FY 24-25, mainly on account of maturity of corporate deposit and lower redemption of investments during the year.

The detailed performance of the various departments is available in Note 33 of the financial statements.

Certificate of Appreciation from the Government of India – Ministry of Finance:

In continuity with earlier years, the Gymkhana received the certificate of appreciation from the Government of India – Ministry of Finance for prompt filing of returns and payment of Goods and Services Tax (GST) for the year 2024-25.

1. All Tax-Free Bonds in the portfolio are of Public Sector Undertakings/ Public Financial Institutions and are rated AAA. The average tax-free return on the same is 7.88% and the interest earned annually is ₹ 5.51 crores.
2. Since the investments in mutual funds are in the Growth option, income is only accounted for on the maturity or redemption of a scheme.
3. The return on investments (XIRR) in the current year was 7.31%.
4. The Market Value of the investments went up by ₹ 23.05 crores during the year (5.14%).
5. Approximately 99.90% of the Mutual Fund investments of the Gymkhana are in AAA Securities and the balance 0.10 % are in AA papers.
6. 100% of the portfolio is fully liquid and can be liquidated in 48 hours.
7. ₹ 20 crores were added to Sensex and Nifty Index Funds during the year. This was in addition to ₹ 20 crores invested in the previous year. These were the only investments made in the financial year 2024-25.

The Auditor's Report does not contain any qualification, observation or comment on financial transactions or matters, which have any adverse effect on the functioning of the Gymkhana. As such, it does not require to be read out at the ensuing Annual General Meeting pursuant to Section 145 of the Act.

The Auditors have not reported any frauds under sub-section (12) of section 143 other than those which are reportable to the Central Government.

Report Of The President, Mr. Sanjiv Saran Mehra At The Annual General Meeting To Be Held On 25th September 2025

Ladies and Gentlemen,

It gives me immense pleasure to welcome you all to the Annual General Meeting of the Bombay Gymkhana Limited. The report on the various sports and sectional activities of the Gymkhana during the year is attached as an Annexure to this Report.

This has indeed been a very special year as we celebrate our **Sesquicentennial Year**. Since our inception in 1875, it has been a glorious journey of 150 years. Our rich sporting heritage and legacy are being celebrated through active participation by members and their families in a wide range of sporting and social events organized by the Managing Committee and various sub-committees.

On the sports front by embracing modern trends and introducing both Mahjong and Padel into its sports calendar, Bombay Gymkhana continues to evolve. This commitment to progress underscores the club's reputation as a forward-thinking institution that values both tradition and innovation.

The Mumbai Cricket Association paid tribute to Bombay Gymkhana on its 150th anniversary with His Excellency Shri C. P. Radhakrishnan, the Governor of Maharashtra presenting a commemorative salver to the club in recognition of Bombay Gymkhana's illustrious legacy and contributions to cricket and sports.

A. Overview

Allow me to present an overview of the performance during the year

1. Good Governance Advisory Group (GGAG);

The GGAG has continued to advise the Managing Committee on adopting best practices that promote transparency, accountability, and member-centric governance. A significant recommendation was the introduction of a **Whistleblower Policy**.

2. Introduction of the Whistleblower Policy

To further strengthen governance, transparency, and accountability, the Whistleblower Policy was implemented. This policy provides a robust framework for the confidential reporting of violations related to financial management, ethics, and misconduct, including breaches of the Articles of Association. It covers all stakeholders—employees, vendors, contractors, suppliers and members—ensuring protection against retaliation. The Gymkhana is committed to a fair and independent investigative process that upholds our legacy of integrity and fiscal propriety.

3. Half-Yearly Unaudited Financial Results

In line with our commitment to transparency, the unaudited financial results for the period 1st April 2024 to 30th September 2024 were shared with members.

4. Special Events

Going ahead, we have significantly expanded our offerings in the areas of sports, catering, bar, entertainment, social and library activities. What stands out is the **intergenerational appeal**, strengthening our identity as **a true family club**. Bombay Gymkhana continues to be recognized as one of the oldest, most respected, and vibrant sporting institutions in India and globally.

The period between **September 2024 till August 2025** witnessed a marked increase in multiple activities in addition to the numerous activities conducted by the various sports sections including the bar, entertainment & catering committee and the library committee. Also BG Cares hosted several events.

(a) Key Sports events;

- (1) Bombay Gymkhana hosted the **Sports Journalists Association of Mumbai (SJAM) Lifetime Achievement Awards** function on the occasion of World Sports Journalists Day. Bombay Gymkhana members, Ravi Shastri (Former India Cricket Captain and coach), Michael Ferreira (Former World and National Billiards Champion and Padma Bhushan awardee) and Niraj Bajaj (Former National Table Tennis Champion) were honoured on this occasion.
- (2) **2nd Bombay Gymkhana 10K Run 2025** – This run course extended to the iconic streets of South Mumbai and participation included seasoned athletes to fitness enthusiasts across all age groups. The event attracted over 2,100 participants and was highly appreciated for its excellent management and conduct. The participants included members, staff and non-members.
- (3) **JSW Indian Open Squash 2025** was hosted by Bombay Gymkhana with a specially set up glass outdoor court on the Bombay Gymkhana lawns with the picturesque Bombay Gymkhana facade serving as the perfect backdrop. This was India's first ever PSA Squash Copper Category Tournament and saw the return of a major squash event to the country after 7 years. It witnessed participation by international players since it is a precursor to many such events being conducted especially with Los Angeles 2028 Olympic Games including squash as a discipline.
- (4) **Badminton Stars at Bombay Gymkhana** – Bombay Gymkhana members enjoyed a rare opportunity to play alongside India's renowned badminton stars which included Lakshya Sen, Satwiksairaj, Chirag Shetty, Treesa Jolly and Gayatri Gopichand. This served as a great interaction opportunity for our junior badminton players who picked up valuable tips from their badminton idols.
- (5) **2nd Bombay Gymkhana Arena Polo Championship 2025** – History was repeated with the successful conducting of the 2nd edition of the Arena Polo Championship where teams battled for the Bombay Polo Challenge Cup (launched in 1882). This was a commemorative tribute to Capt E. L. Marryat and Lieutenant C. L. Young who spearheaded the initiative for the formation of Bombay Gymkhana on 19th June 1875.
- (6) **1st Bombay Gymkhana E-Sports Championship 2025** – This drew a packed house across all age groups. The event marked a significant milestone in the clubs ongoing efforts to engage the next generation and diversify its sporting legacy.

(b) Other Special Events/Initiatives

- (1) **Mumbai Sports Clubs Meet** – Bombay Gymkhana led the way in hosting for the first time ever the Presidents and Vice Presidents of leading sports clubs of Mumbai. The unique initiative was aimed to foster camaraderie, exchange ideas and strengthen bonds among institutions that have been instrumental in shaping Mumbai's sporting culture and ecosystem. A highlight of this function was the launch of a new collective identity – **SPOCOM (Sports Clubs of Mumbai)**
- (2) **Bombay Gymkhana Goes Green** – We have undertaken a Tree Plantation Drive by planting trees in our premises. We're proud to support a greener tomorrow with the planting of trees to nurture nature and play a role in making a lasting impact on the environment for a better future.
- (3) **Defibrillator training at Bombay Gymkhana** – On a regular basis, Bombay Gymkhana staff is trained for rapid response in critical situations like fire and medical emergencies.
- (4) **BG Cares Initiatives**
 - (i) **Bombay Gymkhana supports Jai Vakeel Foundation (JVF).** – JVF has dedicated itself to empowering individuals with Intellectual Disability. We have embraced an initiative that integrates students from JVF as interns. These internships are more than just an opportunity for young individuals; they are transformative experiences for each intern and have enriched our community with inclusion.

- (ii) **Akanksha Touch Rugby League 2024** – Bombay Gymkhana once again hosted the Akanksha Touch Rugby League bringing together a very large number of students from Municipal Schools. The event featured both boys and girls.
- (iii) **Bombay Gymkhana - Concern India Foundation** hosted the Annual Sports meet for children with disabilities. The response was overwhelming with over 170 participants, who thoroughly enjoyed themselves.
- (iv) **Squash-a-Mile** – Bombay Gymkhana once again hosted the Annual Squash-a-Mile event (The Charity Run) in aid of the V Care Foundation which supports the funding of treatment of under privileged cancer patients.
- (v) In addition, Bombay Gymkhana played host to several inter-school championships conducted under the aegis of the Mumbai Schools Sports Association (MSSA). As a commitment to supporting sports, we also hosted several sports events in collaboration with various sports bodies.

5. Wage Settlement of Unionised Staff: Bombay Gymkhana signed a three-year wage settlement with the employees union. This marks the first time in our history that an agreement was reached before the previous terms expiry.

6. Temporary Memberships Under Article 9(2)

To promote excellence in sport and bolster our teams in inter-club and other tournaments, the Managing Committee initiated the Article 9(2) Temporary Membership process effective June 2023. A rigorous screening and monitoring process ensures that only the best talent is inducted.

B. PROJECTS UNDERTAKEN / IN PROGRESS / TO BE SET UP**(a) Squash Courts & Additional FSI Expansion Plans**

Plans are underway to utilize additional FSI by vertically expanding the squash courts from **Ground + 1 to a permissible level** to accommodate multipurpose facilities. Further feasibility studies for enhancing the Main Clubhouse are in progress, with plans to include more space for sports, recreation, and amenities such as underground parking.

(b) UFC Renovation

The much awaited **Upgradation of the Unisex Fitness Centre (UFC)** is underway. Equipment procurement from leading brands is complete following a stringent CP&C selection process. Besides the procurement of equipment, the civil work is also underway.

(c) Launch of Padel facility

Bombay Gymkhana introduced its new Padel facility, adding a fresh and dynamic sport to the clubs repertoire. This modern addition engages the family friendly atmosphere and caters to members of all ages.

(d) Badminton Courts Refurbishment

The badminton courts have undergone structural and surface-level refurbishment to improve playing conditions.

(e) New Banquet Hall christened '1875'

Bombay Gymkhana launched '**1875' a Banquet facility** blending modern elegance with old-world charm. Located on the first floor with panoramic views of the Gymkhana lawns. The venue is ideal for mid-sized gatherings and can be combined with the Palm Court for larger events. It has become a preferred venue for social and cultural events.

(f) Ground Refurbishment

The playground has been re-laid with new turf and levelled whereby an extensive exercise on ground refurbishment was carried out after several years. A modern irrigation system and firefighting provisions have also been installed.

(g) Tennis Court Lights

Work is underway to realign lighting to improve **Lux Levels**, enhancing visibility and playing conditions during evening hours.

(h) Stores Area Setup

A centralized **general store** had been set up in December 2024 to streamline supply usage across catering, sports, and administration—reducing wastage and improving accountability.

(i) Parking

Efforts continue with regulatory authorities to restore **pavement parking** for the Gymkhana within the laid down policies and guidelines of the regulatory bodies.

BADMINTON:

Bombay Gymkhana Badminton Section: A Year of Resurgence, Recognition, and Rising Talent (2024–25)

The financial year 2024–25 has been a momentous and event-packed one for the Badminton Section of the Bombay Gymkhana. This year not only witnessed an impressive line-up of tournaments and exhibitions but also marked significant achievements attained by our members on state, national, and even international stages. The section's commitment to excellence, tradition, and innovation was demonstrated through a variety of activities – from reviving prestigious tournaments, to expanding coaching and mental wellness initiatives and laying the groundwork for infrastructure upgrades. The report below encapsulates the major highlights and achievements that defined this dynamic year.

Outstanding Achievements of Members

One of the proudest aspects of the year were the outstanding performances of our members in elite badminton competitions. At the **NSCI Maharashtra State Open and Maharashtra State Masters Championships 2024**, Bombay Gymkhana players continued to dominate the veterans and master's categories. Leading the charge were the duo of **Ayaz Bilawala and Shailesh Daga**, who clinched the **55+ Doubles title**, which was their **tenth consecutive win** – a rare and admirable feat that speaks of their enduring partnership and consistent high-level of performance. In addition, **Shailesh Daga** secured the **55+ Singles title**, further reinforcing his stature as one of the top players in this category.

Another name that shone brightly was **Naheed Divecha**, who had a spectacular run in the **50+ category**. She claimed top honors in both the **Women's Doubles and Mixed Doubles**, and finished as **runner-up in the Singles** – **her eighth career podium finish** at the state level. Her tenacity and skill continues to be a beacon of inspiration within the badminton community.

The club's in-house marker, **Rajan Samant**, also made Bombay Gymkhana proud with a **third-place finish in the Men's 45+ Singles**. His achievement is commendable and it underscores the depth of talent that exists even within the section's support structure.

To honor these exceptional contributions, a **felicitation ceremony was held on 1st March 2025**, during the in-house Tin 'n' Bottle event. Awards and commemorative plaques were distributed in a warm gathering that celebrated not only victories but also the spirit of dedication and sportsmanship.

Among the emerging players, **Viraj Kuvale** (a playing member) and **Viplav Kuvale** earned their place in the limelight with a **runner-up finish at the Maharashtra State Selection Tournament held in Aurangabad**, narrowly losing to the formidable team of Deep Rambhiya and Krish Desai. They further raised the club's profile by competing in **many international tournaments**, adding an international feather to Bombay Gymkhana's cap.

Vibrant calendar of events at the courts

The year's events calendar was robust, with activities catering to all age groups and skill levels. One of the most celebrated moments that marked the **150th Year Celebration of Bombay Gymkhana** – an exhibition event was held on **28 March 2025**, in collaboration with **DBS Bank**. The event featured an exclusive showcase with India's top badminton players: **Lakshya Sen, Satwik Rankireddy, Chirag Shetty, Treasa Jolly, and Gayatri Gopichand**. BG members had an unparalleled opportunity to watch, interact with and learn from these global icons of the sport.

Another significant milestone was the **revival of the Gautam Thakkar Memorial Badminton Championship**, held from **21 to 24 January 2025**, after a gap of over a decade. With **214 entries**, the tournament was a grand success. It concluded with a well-attended dinner honoring sponsors and veteran members, rekindling a cherished tradition that bridges the past with the present.

From **4 to 12 April 2025**, the **31st GD Birla Memorial Masters Tournament** was conducted, witnessing an enthusiastic turnout and increased prize money, especially in the professional category, which saw **64 entries**. Generous support from the **Birla Family** ensured that the event lived up to its prestigious legacy and was able to reward excellence appropriately.

The much-anticipated **Bombay Gymkhana Badminton Premier League (BGBPL)**, held from **26 to 28 July 2024**, brought together **66 players**, including over **20 invited participants from other clubs**, creating an atmosphere of competition, collaboration, and camaraderie. The format encouraged inclusive play, enabling members across skill levels to participate meaningfully.

The section also successfully hosted the **Annual All Parsis Badminton Tournament** from **8 to 11 November 2024**, receiving **75 entries**, and the **MSSA Inter-School Badminton Tournament (18 to 29 November 2024)**, with a staggering **350 entries**. The latter served as a platform for emerging talent and reaffirmed BG's commitment to youth sports development.

On **1st March 2025**, the club hosted the **Tin 'n' Bottle Jumbled Doubles Championship**, which saw **40 participants**, including **18 under the age of 18**. The unique format of mixed age groups gave juniors the rare opportunity to partner with senior players, fostering mentorship and mutual respect across generations.

The section also continued its long-standing tradition of sending players to prestigious regional competitions, including entries to the **Ullal and Kanji Cups in April 2025**, sustaining the club's presence in top-tier competitive circuit.

Enriching experiences through tours

Beyond the courts, the section organized several **domestic tours**, allowing members to engage in friendly competition and explore the vibrant badminton culture prevailing in different parts of India. The first tour took place in **Baroda on 15–16 June 2024**, with **10 players**. This was followed by a tour to **Chennai from 6–8 September 2024**, featuring **11 players**, and a trip to **Pune**, which included **eight members**. A smaller delegation of **four players** also visited the **Goregaon Sports Club**, promoting inter-club relationships and friendly rivalry.

Friendly Matches and Social Interactions

Hosting and participating in friendly matches has always been a staple of the BG badminton ethos. A notable highlight was the **visit by NSCI on 18 January 2025**, which featured **20 players from each club** and was marked by excellent sportsmanship and mutual respect. Additionally, **friendly matches with Catholic Gymkhana** were explored post-September, adding to the section's efforts in promoting community engagement through sport.

Coaching, Development and Wellness

The coaching program at Bombay Gymkhana has almost 30 children coaching. It received an important upgrade this year with the **introduction of an intermediate-level batch**, in collaboration with **Coach Mangirish Palekar**. A group of **four specially identified students** were selected for this advanced weekly session, tailored to prepare them for competitive play.

Recognizing the importance of physical fitness, the section introduced a **dedicated fitness class for coaching students in February 2025**, enrolling **eight participants**. The class recorded **over 80% average attendance** during its first three months, underscoring its popularity and value.

Mental health and psychological resilience were also taken into focus with **three sports psychology talks** organized for students and senior players alike. These sessions were led by experts such as **Aashna Sundesha and Jaini Nisar from the Reliance Foundation** and **Dr. Sanika More with Kian Guard from MPower**. Topics covered included stress management, competitive mindset training and performance anxiety — critical tools for the modern athlete.

Routine Operations and Infrastructure Improvements

The section also implemented a more **systematic approach to operations**. Beginning this year, a new **data monitoring framework** was rolled out to track:

- Member and guest footfalls
- Marker utility and absenteeism
- Attendance of various member categories
- Shuttle inventory consumption

This data-driven approach will help optimize resource allocation, identify participation trends and improve service delivery across the board.

The **annual brunch held at the Pavilion on 22 September 2024** provided a relaxed setting to **felicitate veterans and recent achievers**, while also serving as a platform for bonding and storytelling among past and present players.

Continuing its commitment to inclusive sport, the section **funded training kits for markers** and provided **free coaching to under-18 children**, further emphasizing its role in community development.

Looking ahead, the section is preparing for a significant **infrastructure upgrade** — the **re-flooring of the badminton courts** using a **7-layer system** that meets **international standards**. Once completed, this will place the club's facilities among the best in the country, suitable for both elite competition and routine play.

Conclusion

The 2024–25 season has been an exemplary chapter for the Bombay Gymkhana Badminton Section — one that successfully blended legacy with innovation, competition with community and performance with progress. From member triumphs and revived tournaments to enhanced coaching and operational upgrades, every initiative has been guided by the values of excellence, integrity, and passion for the sport. With plans already underway for infrastructural enhancements and further expansion of player development programs, the section looks forward to an even more dynamic and fulfilling 2025–26.

CRICKET:

The Cricket season post monsoons 2024 started in the 2nd week of November, which continued till the 1st week of June 2025. Throughout the season, the Section actively participated in (a) Open age competitive tournaments and games against visiting sides, (b) Age-limit competitive tournaments for members, and (c) friendly matches against visiting cricket clubs and cricket academies over the weekends. There was a regular cadence of competitive T20 games played on Tuesdays and/or Thursday evenings, half-day games on Saturday afternoons, children's match on Saturday mornings and full-day Sunday games resulting in a total of 80 plus matches throughout the season.

The Cricket Section would like to place on record the collective efforts and outstanding performance from our Academy Boys under the captainship of Rahul 'Gary' Sagar with the untiring support of coaches Farhad Daruwala and Nilesh Kant/Harshal Merchant, as the Gymkhana team performed reasonably well to retain their place in the Main League of the Dr. H.D. Kanga League 'H' Division Cricket Tournament for the second year in a row and hoping to move up from their group for the next season.

The Cricket Section continued its rich tradition of hosting the prestigious RFS Talyarkhan Memorial Invitation Cricket Tournament in April 2025 under the auspices of Mumbai Cricket Association and sponsored by Nirlon Ltd. The BG team put in an inspired performance and narrowly lost to Cricket Club of India by just two runs in a heart-

stopper. The grand finale between the defending champions Parsee Gymkhana and MCA Colts lived up to its billing, with MCA Colts emerging victorious off the last ball.

The Bombay Gymkhana team successfully defended its title in the 16th edition of the Ghatkopar Jolly Gymkhana Inter Club T20 Tournament – a knock-out tournament contested by eight Mumbai clubs. We fielded a team comprised primarily of the young boys from our Cricket Academy to give them the experience and confidence of playing in open competitive tournaments - they repaid our faith by winning the tournament quite handsomely.

The BG team also participated in the Police Invitational Shield, Cosmopolitan Shield, 75th Salar Jung Invitation Shield Cricket Tournaments of the Mumbai Cricket Association. They lost in the quarter finals of the Cosmopolitan Shield.

The BG team, comprising the young boys from our Cricket Academy participated in the Rathore Cup Under-23 Cricket Tournament and Baama Cup Under-19 Cricket Tournaments of Mumbai Cricket Association.

The icing on the cake was the performance of the Little Stars of our Junior Cricket Academy, who for the first time participated in multiple junior's tournaments such as Little Master Under-12, Bhaskar Thakur Under-12, Dream 11 Under-14 & Professional League Under-14 Cricket Tournaments to name a few, and performed very well. The young team earned some valuable match practice and experience of playing on grounds other than their home turf Bombay Gymkhana.

FOOTBALL & HOCKEY:

1. Introduction

The year 2024-2025 has been an eventful and progressive year for the Bombay Gymkhana Football Section. From hosting prestigious tournaments to nurturing grassroots talent, the Section has continued its commitment to excellence in the sport. We have seen active participation from members across age groups, growing interest in coaching programs and strong representation at inter-club and district-level competitions.

It was a demanding year for Bombay Gymkhana, coming off a year of promotions across all divisions. With every team now competing in the top tiers of Mumbai district football, the season called for consistency, depth and resilience. Each side responded with determined performances, working hard to retain their places at the highest levels of competition.

Off the field, the section continued to expand. A new U-15 girls' team-the BG Wildcats was launched, joining an existing line-up that includes the BG Sharks (Women's Team), BG Falcons (Senior Women's Team), BG Colts (U-19),

the Children's Academy (U-5 to U-15) and the Bombay Gymkhana Senior Team. The section also ran multiple city-wide tournaments, including the Pan-Mumbai U-15 Cup, the BG Blitz and professional tournaments for men and women.

Despite a more competitive landscape, the season reflected the club's steady growth and long-term commitment to its football development across age groups and genders.

2. Coaching and Development

Our structured coaching programs for juniors and adults continued to thrive under the guidance of certified coaches. From the age of 2 to 52, the BG fields are filled with participants with a ball at their feet. The section currently boasts of the Senior Team, the Colts (U-23s), the Sharks (main women's team), the Falcons (Amateur Women's team) and the illustrious BG Academy.

Bombay Gymkhana continues to play a multifaceted role in Mumbai's football scene—fielding senior men's and women's sides in top-tier MFA competitions, while simultaneously nurturing youth talent through the Colts team.

Key highlights:

- Over **100 juniors** enrolled across U-3, U-5, U-7, U-9, U-11 and U-15 age groups.
- **Senior Men's & Women's team coaching sessions** were held thrice a week with strong member turnout.
- Special goalkeeping and advanced tactical sessions were introduced this year.

3. Tournaments Hosted

Chief Justice Chagla Lawyers Cup – This tournament has gone onto become the one of the biggest sporting events for Lawyers across India. Spearheaded by Farhan Dubash, the football section organised a record-breaking Lawyer's Cup this season, with 32 men's teams and eight women's teams taking part in the tournament. Spread across two days, the event saw over 350 lawyers put their football boots on and battle it out on the field as opposed to on the court.

Bombay Gym Blitz - We have been successfully organising this expat and consulate tournament called the BG Blitz for 13 years now, we attract city's best expat and local players taking part, as well as teams coming down from Kolkata and Pune! The multicultural event was a true reminder of why football truly is a global sport and brings people together, within players from 6 continents taking part!

Bombay Gym 9 A Side Football Tournament - The 9-a-side Football Tournament at Bombay Gymkhana officially concluded—and what an unforgettable ride it's been! Over the course of April and May, we witnessed thrilling matches, fierce competition, and an incredible display of talent, teamwork, and sportsmanship. From electrifying match days to the final whistle, this event has been a true celebration of sport, community, and passion.

Bombay Gym Queens Cup - Bombay Gymkhana hosted the inaugural Queen's Cup, a 6-a-side women's football tournament that brought together sixteen professional teams from across Mumbai. The tournament marked a significant step forward in the club's longstanding engagement with women's football. Bombay Gymkhana was among the early supporters of the sport in the city, with a women's team taking shape in the 1990s under players like Freya Dastur. In the past decade and a half, that legacy has been renewed, with the club playing a steady role in nurturing women's football locally. This was our inaugural professional all-women's football tournament (it was also recognised by the Mumbai Footballing Association!) and it drew Mumbai's premier footballing institutions to our stomping grounds.

It was heartening to see the tournament organised by an all-women team led by Zainab Ayaz, long standing manager and advocate of women's football, along with Kyra Aggarwal, Zarastyn Mistry, Sarah Arora and Aditi Jhaveri. Held on April 24 and 25, the tournament featured 16 teams fiercely competing in a round-robin phase, followed by knockouts.

Bombay Gym Kids Tournaments - During the season, we organized four Kids' Football tournaments, inviting teams from various International schools, NGOs, and academies. We should be very proud that we are the only club in Bombay that consistently plays legacy football schools. This year across, tournaments we hosted – Hill Spring, BIS, German School, Greenlawn, Ascend, Campion, BD Somani and ABWA. We also had many school principals attend the events and join us at the bar later.

These tournaments followed a league cum knockout format over two days and all participants received medals for their efforts. The tournaments were a resounding success, delighting both the children, their parents and grandparents. The sight of our club grounds filled with young members passionate about football brought joy to many.

A special note of appreciation to BG Member Mr. Khozema Mohamedbhai, whose unwavering dedication and active involvement have been instrumental in the continued growth of the Bombay Gym Kids Football Program. His passion and commitment have helped create a vibrant platform for young talent to thrive and this tournament stands as a testament to his ongoing support and vision.

4. Bombay Gymkhana Teams

a. BG Colts (U-19)

The BG Colts entered the MFA Super Division for the first time this season, following promotion from the First Division in 2023–2024. In their debut campaign, the Colts narrowly missed a playoff spot by just one point. Over the course of the season, they established themselves as competitive contenders and showed maturity in managing high-pressure games.

The Colts also reached the quarterfinals of the BG Blitz and were placed fourth in the BG 9-a-side Invitational, defeating the eventual tournament winners during the group stage.

Notably, Agastya Raichand was named Young Emerging Player of the Tournament at the Blitz, reflecting the talent and potential within the squad.

b. BG Senior Team

The senior team returned to the Premier Division of the MFA - the highest level of football in the city, and successfully retained its position despite being the only amateur side among professional teams. Competing against salaried squads, the team's performance was marked by discipline, structure, and consistency.

Recognition followed, with Saif Caleb Ali, Ushaine Gandhi and Anas Vadgama nominated for individual awards by the MFA for their performances last season.

Tournament results included a runners-up finish at the Bombay Gym Blitz, third place in the BG 9-a-side League and a semi-final run at the Phuket 7s in Thailand where the team showed it could compete across different formats and against international opposition.

c. BG Sharks Team (Women's Team)

The BG Sharks retained their position in the MFA Elite Division, the highest level of women's football in the city. Competing against experienced and professional squads, the team showed strong defensive structure and tactical discipline.

They finished runners-up in the BG Blitz, fourth at the Queens Cup and semi-finalists at the Phuket tournament, where both the junior and senior squads delivered solid performances. The younger players showed steady growth over the season, with the senior players tempering their exuberance through experience and leadership.

Several players received individual recognition through MFA nominations: Ibreez Tyabji, Aanya Vora, Myra Viridi, Kyra Aggarwal and Isha Kapoor. National call-ups were also earned by Anoushka Gangwani, Aanya Vora and Mihika Iyer, reflecting both individual achievement and the program's contribution to the broader game.

d. BG Wildcats

A key milestone was the formation of the BG Wildcats (U-15 Girls), who debuted at the BG Blitz and followed it up with a brilliant title-winning performance at the BG Youth Cup - a really strong start for the new squad.

e. BG Falcons (Senior Women's Team)

The Falcons continued to train regularly and participated in their first official tournament - the BG Blitz, where they had a spirited campaign, recording a win and holding fancied opponents to draws. The team remains a vital part of the club's inclusive football ecosystem, with a focus on participation and skill development at any age.

5. Member Engagement & Events

- **Friendly Matches:** Regular friendly matches were organized with member participation and visiting teams.
- **Workshops:** Hosted sessions on football fitness, nutrition and injury prevention.

6. Community and Tournament Initiatives

Beyond internal development, Bombay Gymkhana continued to contribute to the broader football landscape. The Lawyers Cup drew participation from across the city and suburbs, encouraging working professionals to return to or take up the game.

The Bombay Gym Blitz served as a platform for players from across the country, including expats and foreign players, while the inaugural BG Youth Cup and BG Queens Cup were launched this season, offering competitive opportunities across age and gender categories.

While the season tested the depth and resolve of every team, it also highlighted Bombay Gymkhana’s steady presence as a competitive and respected force in Mumbai football. With continued focus on development, tournament exposure and inclusivity, the football section is well positioned to build on this momentum in the coming year.

7. Infrastructure & Facilities

- The main football ground received maintenance upgrades, including improved turf and sprinkler line facility.
- Member feedback was actively sought and implemented where feasible.

8. Looking Ahead – 2026 Plans

- Expand junior coaching slots to accommodate rising demand.
- Introduce Football Camps for members and non-members.
- Host a number of high profile Invitational Tournaments at Bombay Gymkhana grounds.

HR Sub-Committee: (Convener – Mr. Prem Kamath)

During the year, the HR Sub-Committee met regularly to address issues pertaining to management staff, unionized employees and contract workers and to deal with emergent issues.

- **Three-Year Wage Settlement of the Unionized Staff signed:**
A major milestone was the successful negotiation and signing of a three-year wage settlement with the employees' Union, effective from 1st April 2025 to 31st March 2028. This is the first time in Bombay Gymkhana's 150-year history that such an agreement was reached before its expiry, reflecting a spirit of mutual respect and cooperation. This proactive approach underscores the Gymkhana's commitment to maintaining harmonious industrial relations.
- **New Appointments at Senior Level:**
Chief Operations Officer (COO): Mr. Gerald Mathew, a seasoned professional with a strong background in hospitality, joined as COO on 13th November 2024.
General Manager – F&B (GM–F&B): Mr. Jaiprakash Zore, an experienced and qualified F&B professional, joined as GM-F&B on 9th October 2024.
- **POSH Awareness Session / Soft Skill Training for staff:**
The existing POSH Policy was revised in consultation with Dr. Sandya Advani, from an external POSH System consultant to extend its scope beyond staff-related incidents and to include members of BG as well. The management has revised the existing policy to ensure comprehensive coverage for all individuals associated with BG.
A two-day POSH awareness program was conducted for executive staff through external Consultant Dr. Sandya Advani in October 2024. The main objective being awareness on Prevention of Sexual Harassment at Workplace (POSH) Act.
Further, the ongoing training sessions were conducted for Captains, Waiters, Reception, Security and Housekeeping through respective executives of the section. The objective was to provide practical skills and insights to enhance their interactions with members/guest to ensure a memorable and positive approach.
- **Discontinuation of the Tips Boxes for staff:**
In view of the declining trend in Tips collection in the boxes, seen during the period starting from April 2023, which was insufficient for distribution amongst staff, the HR Sub-Committee recommended to discontinue the tips policy effective from November 2024.
- **Formulation of Increment Policy for management staff:**
A new policy was formulated for annual increments to the management staff with introduction of Basic scales of pay as per grades. The increments were divided into two components one being fixed and the second component was performance based depending on KRAs ratings.
- **Ten vacancies filled up in unionized category:**
The vacancies arising due to retirement or vacant positions were filled up by giving the opportunity to eligible outsourced staff working with BG, as to maintain the balance between the Union expectations and organizational needs by rewarding loyal workers to ensure continued harmonious relations with Union.
- **Staff Annual Day:**
The Staff Annual Day for all permanent staff and their families including the staff who retired in past one year was held on 1st May 2025 at the Gymkhana ground. A carnival-like atmosphere welcomed guests, featuring exciting fairground attractions such as the Bungee ride, Small Castle Bouncy, and interactive games including Knock the Cans, 7 Up 7 Down, and several specially curated games for ladies and children - all hosted by an engaging host. A variety of food counters served delicious treats including chat, gulab jamun, gola, popcorn,

and freshly made dosas, adding to the festive spirit. Live music performances by Sharmila & Savio kept the energy high and the audience entertained throughout the evening.

Staff who had completed 25 years with BG were felicitated for their dedication and commitment. A photo booth was set up to capture memories, and all staff were presented with 'Silver Coin with BG's Original & 150th year logo'. The day concluded with dinner and dance bringing a perfect end to joyous celebration.

- **Lunch Party for Contract Staff:**

On 26th May 2025 a lunch party was arranged for all contract staff engaged at BG. The event featured a variety of food items, including vegetarian and non-vegetarian dishes, as well as chat and dessert counter. Entire staff were presented with a 'Gift Hamper' as a token of appreciation.

- **Manpower Analysis for Optimum Staffing:**

An analysis covering utilization of existing manpower across various sections, including factors such as member footfalls, covers in F&B outlets, sports & social events, tournaments, average sales of each section, markers productivity, new projects and routine maintenance etc. was done for enhanced efficiency and effectiveness.

- **Jai Vakeel Foundation:**

The Gymkhana had tied up with Jai Vakeel Foundation, an institution working for the people with intellectual disability. BG would be assisting them with job placements and a few of their students have been given opportunity to work for the Gymkhana under the guidance of their supervisor.

The annual **BG Library Litfest** was held in September 2024 with a screening of a documentary film on Parsi theatre The Show Must Go On directed by Divya and Jall Cowasji, a performance of The Gate of Years with Kenneth Desai by Motley Productions and a bilingual fun family musical performance for children Raja Nang-Dhadanga Hai by

Vikrant Thakar. Members enjoyed the theatrical and cinematic rendition of stories in different languages, across all age groups.

The **BG Book Club** continues to encourage members to read. Having turned 15 yrs this year, it has over the years, introduced readers to new books and authors with discussions ranging from keen analysis, plot and character assassinations, dissection of book covers, spoiler alerts to just the sheer enjoyment of having read a good book. The celebration of the club's sesquicentennial year was enough reason to revive the Brunch Short Stories Book Club in July 2025 after almost five years.

With two book clubs conducted by Priya Aga, Shaila Mallik and Anam Bachchooli, the children are engaged in reading and interactive activities. Book Bingo was organised to celebrate World Book Day and a Holiday Camp was held much to the delight of young children and their parents.

By shifting to PNG, we have realized an **annual saving of ₹10,05,687.36**, reflecting a **31% cost reduction**. This strategic move not only boosts economic efficiency but also eliminates the hazards related to LPG cylinder handling, ensuring a safer working environment.

Power Saving Initiative Summary

By implementing power-saving initiatives, we have achieved a total savings of **₹13, 64,332** annually compared to the previous financial year (FY 2023-24). This corresponds to an approximate reduction of **37,615 electricity units (kWh)**, resulting in both financial and environmental benefits of **Carbon footprint reduction approximately 30.85 metric tons of CO₂**.

Some of our Completed Work**1) Swimming Pool Refurbishment**

- Complete transformation of the swimming pool area:
 - The underground baby pool was converted for optimized use.
 - A hot spa area was covered with a gazebo-style roof for a premium, all-weather experience.
 - Two adjoining lawns were merged into one, finished with high-quality selection-I artificial grass and bordered with a Gabion wall for a natural aesthetic.

- Ambience lighting installed across the lawn for an elegant evening look.
- b. This renovation has significantly enhanced the visual appeal and utility of the poolside, making it one of the standout features of Bombay Gymkhana.

2) Banquet Hall Renovation

- A **new banquet hall** - '1875' was created on the first floor, designed to host small parties and member gatherings.
- The space has been completed with refined interiors, offering a **charming and friendly** venue option for events.

3) Waterproofing Works

- **First-floor smoking terrace** waterproofing completed to ensure long-term durability and leak prevention.
- **Gents and Ladies Dressing Room (GDR & LDR)** terrace waterproofing work successfully executed.

4) Accessibility Enhancements

- A **ramp with railing** was constructed at the MG Road MR entrance for safer and more accessible entry for senior members.

5) Padel Court Installation

- Introduced **Padel Tennis**, a globally popular sport, with the installation of **Padel Court 1**—bringing new sporting experiences to members.

6) Compost Machine Relocation

- The compost machine previously located behind Court-3 was **relocated to the ground's far end near the Somani Road fire gate** for better space utilization and reduced visibility.

7) Toilet Refurbishment

- **Children's Park Toilet:** Renovated with new tiling and interiors; accessible from the ground, especially useful during events.
- **Ground Porta Toilets:** Upgraded with interior finishes and tiling to accommodate larger sports event crowds more comfortably.

8) Brand Identity Enhancement

- A **150-year commemorative logo** was installed at the main entrance, featuring a wall-mounted design with a Mangalore tile canopy, mirroring the classic Bombay Gymkhana style.

9) Office & Administrative Upgrades

- **Admin Office (1st Floor)** refurbished with reallocation of the Balloting and Admin sections, optimizing space and presenting a more welcoming layout for visiting members.
- **Main Reception** enclosed with glass cladding and converted into a fully air-conditioned space for improved staff comfort and member experience.
- **Lift Entrance beautified:** Previously narrow entry transformed into an elegant, wheelchair-accessible passage, enhanced with wood panelling and a wooden rafter ceiling.

10) Gas System Modernization

- **PNG (Piped Natural Gas)** system successfully installed throughout the kitchen area, replacing the older LPG gas bank setup—improving safety and cost-efficiency.

11) Nursery Relocation & Aesthetic Enhancement

- LPG gas bank area at the staff gate was cleared and repurposed into a **tilled nursery space, improving the visual appeal of the Gymkhana's back entrance**. Soon members will be able to purchase plants for their personal use also.

12) Departmental Realignment for Operational Efficiency

- **Engineering and Sports departments** relocated from the mezzanine floor to the ground level for better access to utility zones and sports facilities.
- **Accounts, Billing, and Purchase departments** moved from the remote squash building to the **main building's mezzanine floor**, significantly improving inter-departmental coordination and enhancing service accessibility for members.

Renovation work completed:

- **Badminton Court Flooring Replacement** – Badminton 7-layer flooring installation work got completed in nearly three-month period – the refurbished courts were eventually inaugurated on 10th July 2025.

Work in progress:

- **UFC Renovation** – New Gym Equipment delivery likely by October 2025 and interior work will be expected to start from 15th August 2025.

Upcoming Works:

- **Refurbishment of the Gyms Inn & Dining Hall** – Condition of the Gyms Inn floor has started to deteriorate - the wood panelling has got rotten in some areas hence there is a need to refurbish.
- **Squash court Building Extension:** By proposing the squash building extension, the extra space is planned to accommodate the growing demand for upcoming sports infrastructure.
- **Utilization of extra FSI of BG Premises:** The proposed extension of the main building is to accommodate the increasing demand for various sports facilities.

In addition to the above, innumerable maintenance works continued as an ongoing exercise. Our project and maintenance team has been working hard under the guidance of the well qualified Premises Subcommittee.

RUGBY:

The Rugby season at Bombay Gymkhana continued its dynamic momentum through 2024–2025, further cementing our legacy as one of the leading Rugby institutions in the country. This year again saw not only one, but two exciting seasons – our traditional June to October stint, followed by a competitive mini-season from February to May 2025.

Domestic Season Highlights

The season began with the **Wally Abraham Cup** in July–August 2024. Due to the ongoing ground renovation at Bombay Gymkhana, the tournament was hosted in Pune. Despite playing away from home, the BG team delivered a composed and spirited performance to emerge **champions of the Cup**.

The **Bombay Cup**, one of India's longest-running Rugby tournaments, was unfortunately **not held this year** owing to the renovation and upgrade of the Bombay Gymkhana grounds. While its absence was felt, the break allows us to return with an even stronger and better tournament next season.

All India & South Asia Rugby Tournament

This year, the prestigious **89th All India & South Asia Rugby Tournament** was held in **Calcutta**, marking a change from recent years. Top clubs from across India gathered to compete for the coveted title, including CC & FC, Delhi Hurricanes, Sergeants Institute, Magicians and the ever-competitive Bombay Gymkhana.

The BG boys in black and yellow advanced confidently through the pool stages and won a thrilling semi-final. In a tough final, the Delhi Hurricane's, team edged us out as Bombay Gymkhana finished worthy **runners-up** for the 2024 edition. While the result was bittersweet, the team demonstrated grit and cohesion throughout the tournament, earning respect from peers and spectators alike.

Grassroots and Outreach

Bombay Gymkhana's commitment to grassroots Rugby continues to grow through,

- A Touch Rugby Tournament for Akanksha Foundation, engaging young students from underserved backgrounds in a day of Rugby and mentorship.
- The **Mumbai Schools Touch Rugby Tournament**, featuring **140+ teams from 34 schools** and over **1,200 children** – the largest school Rugby gathering in the region, held simultaneously across multiple fields.

International Exposure & Tours

In February 2025, the team travelled to Thailand for the **Bangkok International 10s**, a highly competitive event that provided our players with top international level exposure. In a hard fought final, the Bombay Gymkhana won the bowl.

Looking Ahead

With an unwavering focus on performance, inclusivity, and youth development, Bombay Gymkhana continues to lead from the front in Indian Rugby. The Rugby Subcommittee thanks our players, coaches, volunteers, the broader BG community and the Club management for their tireless support and belief in the vision of this great sport.

RECIPROCAL SUB COMMITTEE: (Arun Bewoor-Convener)

The objective of the Bombay Gym Reciprocal sub-Committee (RSC) is to have Members get access to Clubs in major towns in the country and across the Globe where Members travel the most. Such access will allow them to get comfortable and cost-effective Lodging facilities at these towns plus use the Dining (and Bar) Rooms to enjoy (hopefully) well-prepared, delectable cuisine and play games the Clubs provide viz. Tennis, Squash, Snooker, Swimming Pool, Health Club etc.

With this objective in mind, the RSC met 4 times in the last Financial year to review names of Clubs under a 2-step approach. One is to review and process Applications from Clubs that have approached the Bombay Gymkhana asking for a Reciprocal arrangement. The Applications are analysed, enquiries made from Members and non-Members on stature of the Club, facilities offered and estimate general profile of the Membership. The objective is to prevent persons

using the Bombay Gymkhana who otherwise may not be acceptable.

The RSC has therefore rejected Applications from Club Aggregators, Holiday Homes, 'Luxury' Resorts and other similar bodies where acceptance would 'flood' the Gymkhana with a large number of 'unsuitable' persons.

The other step is to identify Clubs in India and in foreign countries (US, UK, Europe, South-East Asia, Middle East, Africa) where Gymkhana Members could enjoy the hospitality such Clubs offer.

By and large the RSC has succeeded in meeting the objectives set for itself.

The RSC has rejected Applications from good Clubs where traffic would only be one-way, while it has also received 'Rejection Slips' from 2 Clubs for want of Residential facility and/or 'too many Reciprocal' Members already in place in Mumbai.

The RSC has also put in place an SOP for visiting Members bringing Guests. This is now done on a strictly reciprocal basis.

For information, Members of 58 Clubs made 1620 visits to the Bombay Gymkhana. Of these, the top 19 accounted for 85% of the visits and of the 19, 7 were overseas Clubs.

Complete details of Reciprocal Clubs with name, location, infrastructure etc. are available on the Bombay Gymkhana website which can be easily accessed by all Members.

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES: (Convenor – Ms. Aditi Jain)

The Social Activities Sub-Committee has to keep on ideating and coming up with newer and fresher ideas not only for better member engagement but also to ensure that the activities conducted add value to Brand Bombay Gymkhana. Shreyansh Jha our playing member and part of the coaching academy, represented India in the Asian Junior Squash Championship in South Korea. He was selected as India's top seed in Boys Under-15 category. Shreyansh also won the Boys U-15 title at the European Junior Squash tournament held in Hamburg which is a big achievement for an Indian kid. Shreyansh also won a host of tournaments in India, the Northern Slam 5-star tournament in Jaipur and the Southern Slam 5-star tournament in Chennai to name a couple. Diva Shah won the Willingdon Open Junior Squash tournament while Rohan Kejriwal was the runner-up in the Chattisgarh Open tournament in Raipur.

Major Events and Highlights:

1. HCL 80th Senior National Squash Championship 2024 Powered by Bombay Gymkhana:

Bombay Gymkhana hosted the Senior Nationals in August 2024. There was an all-glass court set up for the event in the badminton courts. It was a spectacular setting, featuring high-quality matches from some of India's top Squash players. Hosted and organized by Bombay Gymkhana, the Senior National Squash Championship were held at Bombay Gymkhana after 17 years, Bombay Gymkhana's rich sporting heritage and passion for squash made it the perfect stage for this prestigious event. This Championship also served as a crucial selection trial for the World Squash Federations Men's and Women's team Championship. A few members and pro-coaches took part in the Championship and notable performances came from BG member Aashish Kamat, who was the winner in Men's Over-55 category.

2. Bombay Gymkhana 47th Maharashtra State Open Squash Championship

The Bombay Gymkhana 47th Maharashtra State Open Squash Tournament was held from 20th to 24th July 2024. This was one of the oldest tournaments in the country and also the tournament with the highest prize money after the Senior Nationals Squash. The extremely talented 20 years old Aishwarya Khubhchandani of Maharashtra won the Women's Open and in the Men's final, Mahesh Mangaonkar displayed exemplary skills against the top seeded Veer Chotrani to clinch the title.

3. JSW Indian Junior Open Squash Tournament:

Top level Squash in India returned with the JSW Indian Junior Open, that was played at our iconic Bombay Gymkhana from 24th – 28th March 2025. It was indeed a very proud moment for BG to host this prestigious PSA event, where the knock-out matches were played in a spectacular glass court installed on our ground. India hosted the \$38500 Men's PSA Copper event for the first time. We also hosted the \$15000 Women's PSA

tournament. Promising 17 year-old Anahat Singh, who is India's number one ranked player, cornered glory, claiming the women's title beating Helen Tang (Hong Kong) while the Men's final was won by Egypt's Kareem El Torkey, who overcame a spirited challenge from India's Abhay Singh.

4. **Sila Inter Club Championship:**

Bombay Gymkhana continued its dominance on the squash court by winning back-to-back titles at the Sila Inter Club Squash Championship, held on 5th and 6th April at CCI. This prestigious team event featured participation from seven premier clubs across Maharashtra. The Sila Inter Club Championship organized by SportsXL and sponsored by SILA, aims to bring together the best talent from Squash-playing clubs, while promoting the growth of the sport across India. For the second year in a row, Bombay Gymkhana defeated CCI Club in the finals to lift the trophy.

5. **Squash-A-Mile**

Squash-A-Mile for V Care Foundation, a charity event to help underprivileged cancer patients has been organized by young volunteer kids across schools in Mumbai and supported by the Bombay Gymkhana, was held on 1st September 2024.

6. **Squash Annual Awards function**

The Section also conducted Squash Annual Awards function on 5th April 2025 to felicitate members who won the following In-House tournaments during the season.

SWIMMING:

The BG Swimming Pool will always be a multi-faceted facility that supports the widest cross-section of our members with ages ranging from under 5 to over 75. As a result, your sub-committee's endeavour is to provide to the best of our ability everyone with the space and amenities they require to use the Pool.

Even though the past year has seen a flurry of activity in the sport of Swimming, the sub-committee has also successfully renovated the baby pool, pantry/service counter and landscaped the lawns to enhance the utility and ambience of the poolside. We plan to incrementally develop the South Lawn to include activities for kids like darts, volleyball and a

climbing wall. We also have plans to convert the Gazebo into an al fresco service area that will feature a juice/ice-cream/beer/wine bar where members & kids can sit and enjoy their refreshments throughout the year.

The primary swimming coaching programs, the Beginners & Pre-advanced Coaching by Vistasp Besania, Aqua Fitness by Snehal Bhal, continued to receive a positive response from Members of all age groups. We have also launched new subscription plans for the beginners & pre-advanced programs, Aqua Fitness to allow for better member flexibility in choosing their preferred plans.

In addition to these, the private [1-on-1] Coaching Program by Ravi Babar continues to receive positive feedback from Members who are unable to register for a scheduled coaching class. Taking advantage of the flexibility provided, such members use the Private Coaching slots at a time of their choosing. The program has been a success for both members and their children.

Your sub-committee was proud to host the Inaugural Bombay Gymkhana Interclub Aquatics Championships, held on Sunday, 9th February 2025, marking a milestone in the Swimming section's history. The event witnessed fierce competition, showcasing the athleticism and dedication of 169 participants, spanning age groups from Under-8 to over 61 years, representing 7 prestigious clubs in Mumbai.

The championship brought together swimmers from the CCI, NSCI, Willingdon Club, Khar Gymkhana, Breach Candy Club, and Otters Club to compete against each other and our own BG Swim Team. The event was a celebration of both youth and experience, with each club presenting its strongest contenders in a variety of aquatic disciplines, including freestyle, backstroke, breaststroke, and butterfly events. The under-8 category set the tone with exciting, fast-paced races, while the over-61 category brought forth impressive displays of skill and stamina, proving that age is no barrier to competitive spirit.

The biggest news of the year is the poolside renovation that started on 10th February 2025, and finished in record time to reopen on 1st April 2025. Recent developments at the swimming pool during the renovation have significantly enhanced both its functionality and aesthetic appeal. The main pool underwent a complete rewiring to upgrade its electrical systems and ensure safety and efficiency. The baby pool was thoughtfully sunk to improve accessibility for children. In a move to offer a more serene experience, the hot spa was relocated to Lawn 1, away from the busier pool area.

The surrounding lawns were landscaped to seamlessly integrate with the pool deck, creating a cohesive and natural ambiance blended into a single space. Additionally, the pantry has been expanded by reclaiming some of the space that was previously used for the Ozone plant (now relocated to the Plant room terrace). The larger kitchen space can now be used more efficiently to provide a thoughtful menu for members to enjoy and we plan to relaunch the Pool Pantry immediately after the monsoons. Be assured that your subcommittee considers this an essential component to elevate the member experience and foster an environment that will bring families back to spend weekends at the poolside.

The swim team formed last year continues to gain momentum, with a large number of members registered with GMAAA to represent the Club at various competitions held across the city. Catch the team in action at the pool every Saturday at 8:30 am! Around 30 BG Members have participated in 9 GMAAA events in the last year. Our swimmers have won 52 Medals (18 Gold, 14 Silver and 20 Bronze) over this season with our biggest medal haul coming at our own Interclub Aquatics Championships with a total of impressive 14 medals.

The sub-committee hosted a Swimming Open House on 11 February 2025 to deliberate, among other things, a proposal to allow members to introduce guests to participate in the club's swimming coaching programs like in other sections. This would help defray the costs of programs that had a low member participation and would be piloted with only one program - the "Weekend Beginners" batch.

During the session, several members expressed strong reservations, citing concerns about the inadequacy of the current poolside infrastructure, particularly the limited size of the cloakrooms. Having gauged the sentiment of those present, the sub-committee made a decision to shelve the proposal and instead look at a route of increasing monthly charges to cover program costs.

Looking ahead, as part of the 150 year celebrations, your subcommittee has plans to host the first-ever BG Open Swim Meet in November 2025. During the monsoons, we are planning to host an in-house Ladder Challenge event and a Splashdown Telegames event for some family fun.

Your sub-committee is also committed to improving the standards of the coaching available at the club. Towards that endeavour, Bombay Gymkhana plans to associate itself with ACES – Academy of Excellence in Swimming. Renowned Head Coach Arvind Nainar will train Coach Vispi & Coach Ravi in advanced coaching techniques to help them modernise their skills and run a more effective coaching program.

He will also design and oversee the coaching program and monitor both the students and the coaches as we ramp up the program to provide an advanced batch. This collaboration marks a key stepping stone toward the foundation of the Bombay Gymkhana Swim School, with the vision of developing it into one of Mumbai's premier swimming coaching programs.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF BOMBAY GYMKHANA LIMITED

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Bombay Gymkhana Limited (the "Gymkhana"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2025, the Statement of Income and Expenditure and the Cash Flow Statement for the year then ended on that date and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as the "financial statements").

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 (the "Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the Accounting Standards prescribed under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2021, as amended, ("Accounting Standards") and other accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Gymkhana as at March 31, 2025, its deficit and cash flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit of the financial statements in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under section 143(10) of the Act. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Gymkhana in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ("the ICAI") together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the Rules made thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the ICAI's Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Information Other than the Financial Statements and Auditor's Report Thereon

The Gymkhana's Managing Committee is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Managing Committee's Report but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The other information as specified above is expected to be made available to us after the date of this audit report. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information, and in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained during the course of our audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

When we read the other information as specified above, if we conclude that there is a material misstatement therein, we are required to communicate the matter to those charged with governance.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

The Gymkhana's Managing Committee is responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Act with respect to the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of the Gymkhana in accordance with the Accounting Standards and other accounting principles generally accepted in India. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding of the assets of the Gymkhana and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statement that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Gymkhana's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the management either intends to liquidate the Gymkhana or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Managing Committee is also responsible for overseeing the Gymkhana's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with SAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with SAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Gymkhana to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

Materiality is the magnitude of misstatements in the financial statements that, individually or in aggregate, makes it probable that the economic decisions of a user of the financial statements may be influenced. We consider quantitative materiality and qualitative factors in (i) planning the scope of our audit work and in evaluating the results of our work; and (ii) to evaluate the effect of any identified misstatements in the financial statements.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit. We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

 - (c) Based on the audit procedures that have been considered reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances performed by us, nothing has come to our notice that has caused us to believe that the representations under sub-clause (i) and (ii) of Rule 11(e), as provided under (a) and (b) above, contain any material misstatement.
- v. The Gymkhana has not distributed any surplus during the year and has not proposed the distribution of surplus for the year.

- vi. Based on our examination which included test checks, the Company has used an accounting software for maintaining its books of account which has a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facility and the same has operated throughout the year for all relevant transactions recorded in the software except audit trail was enabled at the database level for Shawman Application to log any direct data changes with effect from August 28, 2024. Further, during the course of our audit, we did not come across any instance of audit trail feature being tampered with, in respect of accounting software for the period for which the audit trail feature was enabled and operating.
 - vii. Based on our sample testing we confirm that the Company has retained the audit trail as a part of its data backup in accordance with the proviso to Rule 3(1) of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014, effective April 1, 2023, and has preserved it as per the statutory requirements for record retention under Rule 11(g) of the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014
3. With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor's Report in accordance with the requirements of section 197(16) of the Act, as amended. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, no remuneration has been paid during the year under section 197 of the Act and hence not applicable.

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1

I. Corporate Information

Bombay Gymkhana Limited ('the Gymkhana') is a Company, limited by Guarantee incorporated under the Indian Companies Act, 1913. The Gymkhana's prime objective is to afford to its Members all the usual privileges, advantages, conveniences and accommodation of a Club and to promote or manage or assist in the promotion or management of all forms of athletic sports, pastimes and recreation.

The Gymkhana is a Small and Medium Sized Company (SMC) as defined in the Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2021 notified under the Companies Act, 2013. Accordingly, the Gymkhana has complied with the Accounting Standards as applicable to a Small and Medium Sized Company.

II. Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements of the Gymkhana have been prepared and presented in accordance with the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles in India (Indian GAAP) to comply with the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013. The financial statements have been prepared on accrual basis under the historical cost. The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are consistent with those followed in the previous year.

(b) Use of estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Indian GAAP requires the management of the Gymkhana to make estimates and assumptions considered in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) and reported income and expenses during the year. The management believes that the estimates used in preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Future results could differ due to these estimates and the differences between the actual results and the estimates are recognized in the period in which results are known/materialise.

(c) Entrance Fees from Members

Entrance Fees from Members are considered as capital receipt and reflected in the Balance Sheet under Members' Funds. Instalment facility is given by the Gymkhana only in respect of Entrance Fees to Permanent Members and accordingly instalment due after one year is disclosed as long term.

(d) Operating Cycle

Based on the nature of services provided by the Gymkhana and the normal time between providing the services and their realisation in cash or cash equivalents, the Gymkhana has determined its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of classification of its assets and liabilities as current and non-current.

(e) Property, Plant & Equipment

Property, Plant & Equipment are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation on items of Property, Plant & Equipment is provided for on the reducing balance method in the manner and as per useful life specified in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013:

The life of the Swimming Pool included in Leasehold Building and improvements is estimated to be 25 years.

For Leasehold Land/Building and improvements depreciation is calculated as per written down value method at rates prescribed in the Income Tax Act, 1961.

Expenditure incurred (other than for separately identifiable new items of Property, Plant & Equipment) for renovating various facilities is recognised as revenue expense as and when incurred.

Capital work-in-progress comprises projects under which tangible assets are not yet ready for their intended use are carried at cost, comprising direct cost and related incidental expenses.

(f) Investment

Long-term investments are carried at cost less provision for diminution, other than temporary, in the value of such investments. Current Investments are stated at lower of cost and fair value.

(g) Revenue Recognition

- (i) Subscription, Games fees, Amenities, Activities/Events, Locker rent and sundry collections are accounted for on accrual basis.
- (ii) Dividend on Investments held by the Gymkhana is accounted for as and when the right to receive the dividend is established.
- (iii) Interest income is recognized on time basis determined by the amount outstanding and the rate applicable and where no significant uncertainty as to measurability or collectability exists.

(h) Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. For this purpose, cost is ascertained based on average purchases during the year.

(i) Employee Benefits

(i) Defined Contribution Plan

Gymkhana's contributions paid / payable during the year to the Employees Provident Fund Organisation and Employees State Insurance Corporation are recognised in the Statement of Income and Expenditure.

(ii) Defined Benefit Plan / Compensated Absences

The computation of the Gymkhana's liability towards gratuity/other retirement benefit plan is determined by an independent actuary as at the Balance Sheet date, using the projected unit credit method, where:

- (a) Past services are recognised on a straight line basis over the average period until vesting of benefits;
- (b) Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in the Statement of Income and Expenditure; and
- (c) Benefit obligation is determined as the present value of estimated future cash flows, using the discount rate applicable to Government Bonds, where the tenure and terms of the Government Bonds are consistent with the tenure and estimated terms of the defined benefit obligation.
- (d) Gratuity liability is funded through employees group gratuity insurance scheme of Life Insurance Corporation of India.

The undiscounted amount of compensated absences expected to be paid in exchange for services rendered by employees is recognised during the year when the employee renders the service. Compensated absences which are not expected to occur within twelve months after the end of the year which the employee renders the related service are recognised as an actuarially determined liability at the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the balance sheet date.

(iii) Benevolent Fund

Benevolent Fund is a defined benefit obligation towards employees of the Union category as other retirement benefits. The obligation arises as employees of the Union category render services in return for employment benefits which the Gymkhana expects to pay in future reporting periods. Permanent workmen after completing 25 years of service on retirement or on death will receive a contribution of one day wages (Basic + DA + HRA) from all workmen and equivalent amount will be contributed by the Gymkhana.

Permanent workmen retiring after 30 years of continuous service to be given a lumpsum fixed amount of ₹25,000 as retirement gift.

(j) Income tax

Current tax

Current tax is the amount of income tax determined as paid / payable (recoverable) in respect of taxable income (tax loss) for an accounting period, other than income regarded as exempt under the principle of mutuality.

Advance taxes and provisions for current taxes are presented in the balance sheet after off-setting advance taxes paid and income tax provision where the Gymkhana intends to settle the asset and liability on a net basis.

(k) Operating Lease

Lease arrangements where the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of an asset substantially vest with the lessor, are recognised as operating lease. Lease rentals are recognised as an expense in the Statement of Income and Expenditure on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(l) Foreign currency transactions

Expenditure in foreign currencies is converted at exchange rates prevailing on the date of the transaction.

(m) Cash and cash equivalents

The Gymkhana considers all highly liquid financial instruments, which are readily convertible into cash and have original maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition, to be cash equivalents.

(n) Provisions and Contingent Liabilities

Provisions are recognised when there is a present obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and there is a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation. Contingent liabilities are disclosed when there is a possible obligation arising from past events, the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Gymkhana or a present obligation that arises from past events where it is either not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount cannot be made.

(o) GST Input Credit

GST input credit is accounted for in the books in the year in which the underlying goods/service received is accounted and when there is no uncertainty in availing / utilising the credits.

(a) Employees' State Insurance Corporation

In 1996 the Employee State Insurance Corporation (ESIC) raised a demand for ESIC dues which was paid by the Gymkhana. In 2011 ESIC raised demand of ₹29.17 lakhs for interest on the 1996 dues. In April 2014, ESIC issued another Order towards damages for ₹16.26 lakhs. The Gymkhana has contested both the demands.

- The Gymkhana lost the appeal at the Hon'ble Bombay High Court and accordingly interest demanded on the 1996 dues of ₹29.17 lakhs was fully paid in March 2022.
- In respect of Order towards damage the Gymkhana lost the appeal at the Employee Insurance (EI) and thereafter filed an appeal at the Hon'ble Bombay High Court. The Gymkhana has made a provision of ₹15.77 lakhs towards the damages of ₹16.26 lakhs and accordingly disclosed a contingent liability of ₹0.49 lakhs (refer Note 23(i) (e)).

(b) Service tax CENVAT credits

The Gymkhana had provided an amount of ₹93.43 lakhs and carried forward in relation to a classification dispute pertaining to "mandap-keeping" services by claiming abatement of its Service tax liability for the prior years. The authorities continue to dispute the said classification and the consequential abatement claimed. In the previous year, based on the advice given by the Gymkhana's consultant the CENVAT credit was utilized. The Gymkhana, while utilizing this CENVAT credit continue to retain the provision.

(1) Sales Tax -

The Gymkhana had received an order under the Bombay Sales Tax Act on account of incorrect classification of sales, irregular availment of input tax etc. relating to the year 2001-02 for which the Gymkhana had filed an appeal with the said higher regulatory authorities. In July 2024, on completion of the assessment, the Gymkhana received the Order with a revised demand of ₹93.75 lakhs as against the original demand of ₹277.37 lakhs. Under advice of our consultant the Gymkhana has appealed to the Bombay Sales Tax Tribunal against the order and does not expect any outflow of resources for the claim and hence continues to disclose the same as contingent liability.

(2) Service Tax -

On 4th December, 2018 the Gymkhana received Service tax Order from the Jt. Commissioner, CGST & CX, Mumbai – 1, to pay ₹211.03 lakhs including interest and penalty for irregular availment of CENVAT credits from FY 2006-07 to FY 2010-11. Further the Gymkhana received another Service tax Order dt. 14th December 2020 from the Pr. Commissioner, CGST & CX, Mumbai, to pay ₹9.25 lakhs excluding interest on incomes deemed to be tax-free under Service tax from FY 2005-06 to FY 2015-16. The Gymkhana has filed an appeal to the higher authorities within due date and the Gymkhana expects no outflow of resources.

Further the Gymkhana had filed SVLDR against the SCN received from Assistant Commissioner for the period April 2017 to June 2017 to pay ₹3.41 lakhs including interest and penalty for not paying Service tax on Catering Sales done in the open verandah area of the premises. The Gymkhana had filed an appeal before the Commissioner (Appeal). However, the Commissioner (Appeal) rejected the Gymkhana's plea and directed the Gymkhana to pay the dues. The Gymkhana had filed an appeal before the Hon'ble High Court against the Order. The Hon'ble High Court vide its order remanded back the case to the Service Tax authority for final disposal under the SVLDRS scheme. Rectification order from the department is awaited. The Gymkhana expects no outflow of resources and hence continues to disclosed ₹130.25 lakhs as contingent liability.

(3) Property tax -

The Gymkhana had received notices from Brihan Mumbai Mahanagar Palika (BMC) under Section 162(2) and Section 154(1C) of the Mumbai Municipal Corporation Act, 1888 (MMC Act) towards levy of increased value of Property taxes from April 1, 2010 to March 31, 2025 amounting to Rs.1,077.57 lakhs (excluding penalty if any). The Gymkhana has contested the increased value of Property taxes in the Court of Small Causes Mumbai. The Gymkhana believes that it does not expect outflow of resources.

(4) Income tax -

The Vivad se Vishwas (VsV) Scheme was announced during the Union Budget, 2020, to provide for dispute resolution in respect of pending income tax litigation. The objective of Vivad se Vishwas is to inter alia reduce pending income tax litigation and benefit taxpayers by providing them peace of mind, certainty and savings on account of time and resources that would otherwise be spent on the long-drawn and vexatious litigation process.

The Gymkhana had opted for VsV Scheme for its pending income tax cases pertaining to AY 2007-08 to AY 2017-18 and accordingly, filed application for withdrawal of appeals disputed with High court/ ITAT/ CIT appeals which were irrevocable. In all these assessment years the Income tax authorities had made addition of complimentary liquor received by the Gymkhana. Subsequent to the year-end, in July 2025, the Gymkhana received Form 5 from the Income Tax Department related to the aforementioned VsV applications. The financial impact and necessary adjustments arising from the receipt of Form 5 will be assessed and reflected in the financial statements for the year ending March 31, 2026. As of the date of these financial statements, the impact is being evaluated in consultation with tax advisors.

The Gymkhana had received an order from the Commissioner demanding tax payable under section 14A in prior years. The Gymkhana has filed an appeal with the higher authority and believes that it does not expect outflow of resources and hence, the same has been disclosed as contingent liability.

In earlier years, the Gymkhana entered into the following two lease agreements for land now in its possession:

- (a) Lease agreement dated November 6, 1908 in respect of the Main Plot measuring 13,557 square yards that expired on November 5, 2007; and
- (b) Lease agreement dated January 25, 1941 in respect of the Ground measuring 23,592 square yards that expired on December 17, 2006.

The Gymkhana had applied before expiry for renewal of the lease agreements to the Government of Maharashtra and The Collector, Mumbai City. Government of Maharashtra Revenue and Forest Department has issued Government Resolution No. Land-2512/08/C.R.51/L-2 dated 23rd June 2017 (GR 2017) effective date for which was January 1, 2017. The lease agreements are yet to be finalised.

The Collector of Mumbai had reassessed the areas of the Gymkhana, removing certain portion of the land, occupied by the Gymkhana for civic amenities, on 29th October, 2018 and sent a notice to the Gymkhana to pay an amount of ₹ 79.54 lakhs for the calendar years 2017 and 2018. The Gymkhana has disputed the reassessed areas as assessed by the Collector of Mumbai and made payment of ₹ 88.65 lakhs based on old full area basis.

There is no additional demand from the Collector of Mumbai and the Gymkhana continues to pay ground rent on old full area basis @ 4% increment every year as per GR 2017.
